

Parade will travel along 119th Street from Indianapolis Blvd. to Whiting City Hall. This festive parade features floats, bands, our friend the Easter Bunny, local community groups, and plenty of Easter spirit.

Hello Everyone,

As I write this article, we are experiencing temperatures in the 50's. So far so good as far as a mild winter. Hopefully that continues.

On Thursday, February 1st, an incident occurred at the BP Refinery causing the plant to be evacuated. In cases such as this, correct infor-

mation and communication are essential. The City of Whiting is pleased to announce our partnership with Smart911.com. Smart911.com is an Alert System that residents can subscribe to which allows an individual to opt into various notifications including those for Lake County (non-emergency, as this event was deemed). In addition, the City can send out special alerts for such things as street closures, boil alerts, community events, parades and other information. You can choose which alerts to receive and how to receive these alerts. They can be sent to you via e-mail, a voice message to your cell or landline, or as a text to your mobile device.

IN THE EVENT OF A DECLARED EMERGENCY (I.E. EVACUATION, SHELTER IN PLACE, ETC.) THE LAKE COUNTY EMERGENCY ALERT SYSTEM AND RAVE WOULD PROVIDE AN ALERT ON EVERYONE'S CELL PHONE IN THE DESIG-NATED AREA AS WELL AS CALLING LANDLINES WHETHER YOU ARE OR ARE NOT SIGNED UP FOR SMART911 NOTIFICATIONS.

There is no cost to subscribe to the Smart911.com service. I encourage all of our residents to participate in this program to be better informed of non-emergency situations and upcoming City events.

On Friday February 2nd, I had the pleasure of attending a fundraiser for our Historical Society. The event was held at the Knights of Columbus and attended by approximately 175 people. It was a night of fun with the proceeds going to a very worthy cause. My compliments to Marty Dybel who helped organize the fundraiser along with numerous members of the Historical Society. My hope is that this can become an annual event. The enthusiasm surrounding our Historical Society is growing, which bodes well for the future. Work this year will include the demolition of the structure at 1610 119th Street, cleaning and grading the empty lot so an addition can be constructed to the recently remodeled building at 1606 119th Street.

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





This year's Carl A. Binhammer Award recipient is **Milan Kruszynski**, a lifelong resident of Whiting-Robertsdale, married to Carolyn (Betustak), and the father of three: Kyle, Katie, and Sara. Milan is a proud graduate of Immaculate Conception School and Clark High School; he earned his undergraduate degree at Illinois College. He is a very active member of the community, serving in a variety of roles and capacities as a volunteer, and is someone always willing to give back to his community:

Joe, a lifelong resident of Whiting Robertsdale, is known as a go-to kind of person, assisting in multiple ways. He puts in countless hours to make sure



# Whiting Fire Dept. Announces Participation with the Home Fire Campaign by Don Harbin, Fire Chief

The Whiting Fire Department is proud to announce its participation in the Home Fire Campaign launched by the American Red Cross, which aims to prevent fire related-deaths and injuries while making the homes in our community safer. The Home Fire Campaign consists of the installation of 10-year life lithium battery smoke alarms and providing residents with home fire safety information, including how to create an escape plan. The goal of the Whiting Fire Department and the American Red Cross is to provide these items free of charge to all Whiting residents who request this service.

The American Red Cross phone number to begin the process is **1-888-684-1441**. Once the initial call is made the resident will then receive a call back with a scheduled installation date and time to be completed by the Whiting Fire Department. Due to limited installation dates, the Home Fire Campaign will be rolled out to the city on a block-by-block basis, with eventually the entire City of Whiting having an opportunity to participate in the program. Businesses or large-scale property managed buildings are not eligible to participate in the program.

The program is now open to all Whiting residents on the blocks of **Fischrupp Ave.**, **John St.**, **Fred St.**, **121st St.**, **Steiber St.**, **Schrage Ave.**, **White Oak Ave.**, and the **2600 block of Birch Ave.** and will work its way through the entire city. Residents will be notified when their street is available to schedule the service. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact the Whiting Fire Department at **219-659-1069**.

### Triduum by Margaret Saliga

Holy Week begins March 24th with the Palm Sunday remembrance of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem and ends on March 31st, Easter Sunday in celebration of Jesus' Resurrection. This is the most solemn and glorious week in Christianity, for it celebrates the great gift of Salvation: the life, suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus the Christ - the Paschal Mystery.

The word Triduum comes from the Latin (tris-"three"; dies - "days") and climaxes the Holy Week observance during several days, from sundown on Holy Thursday to sundown on Easter Sunday. The liturgies of these sacred days involve the mystery of God's plan to save fallen humanity through the passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus, the God-man. This wondrous mystery is remembered as one profound event, which extends over the final days of Holy Week.

For Christians throughout the world, Holy Week and the Easter Season are the most important time in the liturgical year. Together Christians celebrate God's generous, merciful love for all humanity.

The W/R Catholic community will celebrate the Holy Thursday liturgy of the Lord's Supper on March 28th, 7pm at St. John the Baptist Catholic Church. This begins the time of profound remembrance, as we enter the sacred Triduum to pray the profound mysteries of our faith.

On the night before he died, Jesus washed the apostles feet and then ate a final meal with them as he commissioned them: "Do this in remembrance of me." Following Jesus' example, our priests recommit themselves to faithful service, as they symbolically wash the feet of church members. Then the faithful partake in the Eucharistic banquet, thereby fulfilling Jesus' command to "Eat my flesh and drink my blood."

Following the mass, all are invited to spend the remainder of the evening praying and keeping watch, at church or at home. In the garden of Gethsemene, the apostles all fell asleep. We do well to keep watch and pray for the needs of our families, our community and our world.

Good Friday, March 29th commemorates the day Jesus brought salvation through his horrific crucifixion. Holy Saturday, March 30th reverences Jesus' burial in the tomb, which was followed by his glorious resurrection from the dead.

Jesus is the victor over death. Our sadness gives way to resurrection joy as we sing our Easter Alleluias and proclaim Christ is risen! Indeed, He is risen! Because He lives, we too will live eternally.

### The Year of the Volunteer?

Historically, Whiting Robertsdale could bank on its level of volunteerism. It may not have been the wealthiest community in the nation, the smartest (although we certainly have our share of know-it-alls), the prettiest, the cleanest (we continue to have a litter problem), but one of the more unique aspects of living here is that we had a lot of people who were willing to give their time. Those volunteers were what made our community what it is, and the envy of many others. But that isn't quite the case any longer, and that could be a huge loss for the community, its identity, and its future.

Our community is dependent on volunteers: our churches, schools, fraternal organizations, and events like Pierogi Fest, the Easter Parade, Wickedly Whiting, the Kris Kringle Market, Studio 659, the concerts on Sheridan, the cleanups, flower giveaways, and much more all occur because of volunteers. Those events and activities are what define us, but all those activities are only possible due to volunteers, and most of those activities largely draw from the same small group of individuals. Even this newspaper is largely written by a group of volunteers.

I think many forget the importance and impact that volunteerism has on our quality of life, so let me give you just one example. Everyone loves to talk about Pierogi Fest, which has put our community on the map more than any other event. People come from throughout the United States and even abroad to partake in the fun. However, to make Pierogi Fest a success, we have to fill more than 650 volunteer positions, each working about 4 hours. Giving up 4 hours once a year is a pretty reasonable ask, and no, you do not have to be a member of the Chamber of Commerce either.

Yes, we all have other things to do, and your time is valuable but so is mine and those that currently volunteer. An even bigger challenge is that those of us who volunteer are getting older, while our events continue to grow in size and popularity. That translates into needing a lot of additional help.

There are 12,000 people in Whiting Robertsdale, and another 3,000 in North Hammond. If we want to continue to enjoy our unique quality of life, then we need more people to step up and help out by volunteering. Just imagine what we could do if everyone donated 4 hours a year to different community causes: the sound of the church choirs, the fun that our events would provide, not to mention the fun everyone would have being part of those events and the community! On the other hand, imagine what it would be like if there were no choirs, no concerts, no festivals, parades, art programs, and events. I know it sounds a bit dire, but our community would be like the many others that wish they were Whiting-Robertsdale.

### LARC and WREN –Two "Birds" of a Feather Working Together for the Better by Tom Markovich

A new "bird" has landed in Whiting/
Robertsdale: WREN (an acronym for Whiting
Robertsdale Environmental Neighbors). Together
with the Chamber's LARC (the Litter Awareness
and Remediation Committee), WREN will help to
raise environmental awareness and involvement
of Whiting and Robertsdale residents and will
take action to bring positive, visible results to our
lakefront community. The synergies of the two
groups working together in the areas of community clean-up and resident involvement will be
unique. We have only just begun.

Lynn Haynes' article elsewhere in this newspaper introduces WREN and its first project: the NexTrex Challenge. Three plastic collection bins will be placed at these 3 locations in the community: Whiting Library Children's entrance, Whiting City Hall entrance, and Stracks.

The challenge is to collect 1000 pounds of plastic, including bottle caps, over a year's time. If we meet the challenge, we can win a bench made from the recycled plastic which will be placed somewhere in the community, a location that will be decided on when the contest is over.

All plastic must be clean, dry, and free of food residue. Plastic grocery bags, bread bags, bubble wrap, dry cleaning bags, newspaper sleeves, ice bags, plastic shipping envelopes, Ziploc and other food storage bags including cereal storage bags, bottled water case overwrap, salt bags plastic wrap and stretch film, wood pellet bags and produce bags are acceptable,

A list of acceptable caps and lids is too lengthy to include here; to keep it simple, however, know that we'll collect any plastic lids. We will sort them after they're received. Please ask family, friends, and your favorite local businesses to save plastic as well as plastic caps from bottles and containers. It will take all of us working together to achieve this very worthy goal.

In the next article we'll have information about the upcoming Earth Day clean-up efforts. Keep your eyes open and get involved. There's so much that each of us can do to make Whiting Robertsdale the best it can be. Thank you for stepping up to the challenge. Until next time.

### **1ST DISTRICT NEWS**

Hello everyone. Today's column focuses on environmental issues of concern in the 1st District.

Cargill needs to be a better neighbor. In January, residents had no immediate response to calls about the loud humming noise that occurred over a 6 -hour period during the night. If they are community partners, they need to respond to complaints effectively. When residents call, there should be a process in place to investigate within the plant and/or have their security or management go into the neighborhood to recognize how they are affecting the quality of life.

Further examples of inadequate responses to resident concerns occurred when tanks at the BP refinery leaked and released toxic vapors, and when BP experienced a power outage. Residents saw flare stacks sending flames into the air, black smoke trailing into the distance, and felt the ground shaking. North Hammond residents watched as the black and grey smoke in the Northeast suddenly shifted in their direction because of a wind shift. Residents wondered what was in that smoke and haze. BP's communication with the community was lacking and needs to be remedied.

I was one of several concerned citizens, city officials, and environmental groups who were locked out of E.C. Central High School when the meeting to address the BP refinery air permit renewal was abruptly cancelled. The meeting was rescheduled to take place at Calumet College.

Residents also need more information about 3-141st Street from the developer and the city. I have asked for reports and plans and although I have attended several meetings, I still don't have a firm grip on the plans to remediate and develop that site. This is a concern because the environmental history there is fraught with issues and past operations have adversely impacted the residential, industrial and recreational resources that surround the site. I will keep on top of this planned development so history does not repeat itself.

Former Clark HS Athletic Field infrastructure is moving along and the generally mild winter has been much appreciated by the construction crews. The new Fire Station #2 is progressing - steel framework is up and exterior block walls are being erected.

February 9th was the deadline for candidates to file for the May primary. Please exercise your right to vote. April 8th is the deadline to register to vote, and in-person voting begins April 9th. # Beauty Will Save Whiting, Indiana: Support Whiting's Historic Art and Architecture

Have you ever seen a painting so beautiful you couldn't stop looking at it? The painting is not moving, but it moves you! Beauty doesn't just attract, it can also transform. As Fyodor Dostoyevsky wrote, "Beauty will save the world."

Whiting boasts striking beauty in some of its church-

es, including St. Mary Byzantine Catholic Church on Clark Street. The founders had the intuition that beauty has a summoning power. Consider St. Mary's architecture: The current building dates to 1917 and was designed by architect and St. Mary's sixth pastor, Fr. Michael Corbeau (Korba). The large dome ceiling supported by pendants is modeled after the renowned sixth-century Hagia Sophia in Constantinople, today Istanbul. It was the largest church worldwide for almost 1,000 years and the reference point for architectural excellence. When Michelangelo was charged with the design of St. Peter's Basilica in Rome, he looked for examples of perfection and based his design on Hagia Sophia.

In the early 20th century, it was uncommon for Eastern churches in the United States to pay such attention to architectural history, so St. Mary's architecture is unusual for this period.

The church interior offers a vast canvas. For many years, St. Mary's ceiling and walls featured dramatic, baroque images of the glorious mysteries of the Rosary. These paintings accompanied and inspired many, including St. Mary's parishioner and painter Al Odlivak, dubbed "the Norman Rockwell of Whiting." He considered his finest work to be his paintings of the church interior.


In 2012-13, St. Mary's repainted its interior to incorporate traditional Byzantine iconography to match its architecture inspired by Hagia Sophia. What remains from the original design are the

stained glass windows, dating to the first half of the 20th century. They feature saints and scenes from the New Testament. The time has come to preserve these historic windows and ensure they are around for a long time. This process, which will involve installing protective glazing and interior venting and repairing window frames, will keep our windows watertight and temperature-resistant and hedge against future corrosion. The new glazing will also expose our windows to the outside for passersby to appreciate.

To support this important preservation project, we are inaugurating our "Searcher for the Lost Gala," on Saturday, April 13th, 6 pm-10 pm, at The Lost Marsh.



### **Holding Hands**

One of the most important lessons we learn is to hold hands. Anyone who's been to kindergarten knows the rule by heart: "When you go out, hold hands and stick together." During the school year, we see this rule practiced many times as groups of small children walk along with their hands joined together. Like links in a joyous chain, they enrich us with their laughter. But for those of us who didn't go to kindergarten, we learned the handholding rule just the same. Mom taught us.

Then, in what seemed like a short time, the day came when he no longer needed to hold his mother's hand. Now when they went shopping, he held his hand as they crossed streets and stepped

walked proudly by himself, alongside his mom like a grown-up. His mother was pleased with her son's self-reliance and confidence. She smiled to herself; he had learned well.

Once he started third grade, he would not hold hands again until adolescence. When he did, it wouldn't involve his mom or a fear of being lost. What fostered his renewed interest in handholding was an affair of the heart. Now when he held hands, delicious new feelings made their presence known. Even in winter, with her thick woolen mittens gently grasping his gloved hand, he felt her touch. Before long, he was holding hands on a steady basis with one young lady. They shared a mutual affection for each other, and their relationship grew stronger still. More than fifty years later, they continue to hold hands.

When they became parents, they, too, taught their children to hold hands, a prerequisite for crossing streets, stepping up and down curbs, and going shopping. Every time a child's mother or father takes them by the hand, they instill a sense of belonging. Such guardianship reinforces the child's worth, strengthens the parental bond, and nourishes the family. Holding hands is therapy for a lesson, then shared as a gift, becomes a treasure, the body, spirit, and soul. Fringe benefits.

Some things in life come full circle, reflecting both sameness and change. So, it is with holding hands. In the beginning, one hand is strong, the other hesitant, uncertain. One hand guides, the other dependent. During adolescence and many years thereafter, joined hands become one, sharing strength and confidence from which lifetimes are built. As the circle begins to close, one hand is assuring, protective, the other is frail, fragile, unsteady, and tentative. Yet when joined together—when linked as one—an extraordinary transformation occurs. The joined hands convey commitment, a wordless promise of guardianship. Holding hands engenders holding hearts. ### **Writers Connect Celebrates 1 Year Anniversary** by Elliot Bibat

On the first and third Tuesdays of each month, the writers of Writers Connect meet at the Whiting Public Library to share their writing and discuss their work. Some of them bring poems, others bring short stories, journal entries, essays, or scripts. What began a year ago as a paid writing class at Studio 659 evolved into a weekly meeting of these writers to talk about what inspires their writing and to learn more about the process from one another.

"I always wanted to have a writing class or a writing group in Whiting. So when I went to people and asked, I pictured more of a structured setting. But what developed was so much richer," said Deb Salinas, who organizes and leads the Writers Connect meetings, "We gathered so many talented poets, storytellers, screenwriters, and novelists, some beginners and some with published work, and what we've learned from each other is so much richer than what we could learn in any classroom, and I think we inspire each other."

Writers Connect is comprised of writers from varying walks of life, from college students to retirees, so the writers are able to convey very diverse points of view when sharing their work. One writer, Amie Bernard, said that Writers Connect has helped her branch out from the things she typically writes about and expanded her horizons by urging her to look inward when writing.

"When I came to this group, I started out being what I call an 'urban landscape poet' because I pretty much wrote about Whiting and the refinery and the tank farms," Amie said, "but once I got exposed to everybody else's style's, stream of consciousness in particular, I found myself doing that and it's opened up a lot of doors for me, breaking those barriers that I put on myself. I can't tell you the last time I wrote an urban landscape poem."

**Dave Sandrick**, who started out as the instructor of the class, now attends as a fellow writer and expanded on the topic of looking inward.

"I always appreciate what people pull from within, who they are and what they're wrestling with, our demons of the past or our past mistakes, our past triumphs," Dave said, "The pain and the hurt and the rawness is what sticks around. Writing helps us process that again and it may take ten writings. Who knows?"

"I really enjoy the different genres that come up in this group," said Donna Strabavy, another writer who regularly attends meetings with her poems, "I like everybody's different points of view and different writings with poetry and stories and plays and skits. It gives everybody a chance to get some inspiration from everyone else."

In a typical Writers Connect meeting, attendees are encouraged to share a piece of writing they've worked on over the two weeks since their last session. There's no pressure to share if they don't wish to, if they have nothing prepared, or if they feel what they're working on isn't ready yet. With what writing is shared, discussions are led without judgement. Other writers express what they like about the piece, offer constructive feedback, and often share experiences they may have had that relate to the subject matter of the writing.

"I think it's really helped because improvised speaking, letting everything out at once, may not be exactly what you feel," Matthew Mota, one of the group's younger writers, expressed, "When you're able to write it out and look at it, add a little structure to it, and really examine your own words, that's what brings out your own thoughts. That's what I've really enjoyed about this group - putting my thoughts out with more of a refined structure to it, in a structure where I can look at it and say 'Now that's what I was trying to get across."

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### **Whiting Code Enforcement**

A sometimes-overlooked part of Code Enforcement but a very important part of city services is garbage collection. Garbage and recycling collection is an integral part of providing city services to keep our city clean and healthy. There are a couple of city ordinances related to garbage that could result in a violation or fine if noncompliance occurs.

WMC 8-108: Garbage in receptacles.

WMC 8-112: Bagging of garbage. It shall be unlawful for any individual to dispose of any garbage in any can or receptacle without such garbage being bagged and tied or sealed.

WMC 8-131: Importing of waste. It shall be illegal for any person, business, or entity to import or contract to import waste materials of any type, including garbage, refuse, construction, and demolition.

If you have construction materials such as wood, drywall, flooring, dirt, rocks, etc. do not place these items in the garbage tote. Place them in plastic construction bags and place the bags next to the garbage tote for pick up. If you have larger items, please place them neatly behind your property for pickup. Nails must be removed for workers safety.

The general rule is each single-family house should have one garbage tote and one recycle tote. Multi-unit buildings would have more. If a larger family requests an additional tote, the Public Works Dept. will try and fulfill the request. We have seen over the last couple of years an increase in tote requests bordering on the ridiculous. We understand that disposal methods have changed with online ordering and home delivery creating a large amount of recycle material. Please breakdown your boxes and neatly place them behind your garbage totes for pickup. If you have a large amount of accumulated cardboard or garbage before your normal pickup day, call our Public Works office and our workers will be happy to pick up the material. Garbage totes are not storage containers that are for personal use in your basement or garage. If you have garbage or recycling totes that you don't use, please call Whiting Public Works at 219-659-1219 for pickup. If the Public Works Department workers find totes that week after week are not used, the totes will be returned to the Public Works facility. This not only saves the taxpayers money; it also greatly improves the appearance of our alleys. Please help our Street Department workers by doing your part to keep Whiting clean, safe and a great place to live





Mayra Reynoso – Deportation Officer for Homeland Security: Spoke about the duties of a deportation officer versus misconceptions the community has about the job. They arrest criminal individuals who are then placed into immigration proceedings where a judge determines whether they can remain in the country or not. If the judge rules against the individual they are escorted back to their home country. Homeland Security also assists at the border. Explained the difference from individuals that are already here illegally waiting for their opportunity to obtain status in the US and Asylum seekers (they fear prosecution or harm from their home country). Asylum seekers have to be interviewed for credible fear but the immigration judge makes that determination. Discussed sanctuary cities not assisting or releasing convicted criminals into our custody.

Nancy Machuca – Cline Avenue Bridge: Came to talk about the drive and save with the community rewards program. By enrolling in this free program, you can take the Cline Avenue Bridge for a 60% discounted rate. Only 2 axle vehicles with transponder (either an I-pass or E-ZPass) will qualify. The website to get started is clineavnuetolls.com/Web/toll discount. Once your registration is confirmed, the discount starts with your third trip across the bridge. Every 90 days you are required to make two crossings at regular price to maintain program eligibility. 
